Sometimes when I think I have everything figured out, and it doesn't quite go like I figured, I hear God say, "Persevere. Hang in there. Keep going." But most often when those things happen, I hear God say, "Adjust."

Recently we had one of those times at Hope Outreach. And it was not a little adjustment - it was giant. As you know from our last newsletter, and can read about again in this one, we are launching our outreach to the homeless. Actually we have helped people in homeless situations since we began in the little 3 bedroom house behind Moto Photo. But this is different. This is much more comprehensive.

We thought we had everything figured out.

We knew **who** - those without a home, of course. But "who" in this case means a lot of people need to be involved in order for it to work. So we set up an Advisory Council of the "who's who" of those who provide assistance in Enid. And "who" also means the whole community is needed to help us with raising the awareness, the funds, and the personnel to make it work.

We knew **what** - offer not only some overnight shelter, but a continuum of care case management approach with a truly individualized mix of compassion and confrontation to help folks solve their own problems.

We knew **why** - because often a person who has gotten so far down that they don't even have a place to stay needs more than the first months rent and deposit. That can't happen until they get a job, and they need an address and clean clothes to get that, and so on.

We knew **when** - right now! God says, "Don't put off helping your neighbor if you

Just when you finally have everything figured out, it changes again and that's just what has happened with our R.O.O.F. building.

Unfortunately negotiations with the landlord of the Family Resource Center were proving impossible. Our contract was up the end of May and there was no hope in sight to renew our lease. Currently, the volunteer Mentors are helping approximately 80 young women and 12

young men in the Earn While You Learn program. Since Hope Outreach is a team effort, it was unanimous that we couldn't let a successful program like The Family Resource Center miss a beat. Effective June 1, 2006 the 815 W. Broadway building which originally was to be the R.O.O.F. will become the new Family Resource Center.

But now, what about The R.O.O.F.?

There is a larger building in the same neighborhood as well as another one that recently has come to our attention. I'm still

Better yet, the person creating this design has a picture in his mind of what it will become when it is finished. Like this example, God already knows what the finished product will be. He has a plan.

Jeremiah 29:11-12 says, "For I know the plans I have for you, 'declares the Lord,' plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call upon me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you." God isn't just winging this. He didn't just wake up one day and say, "maybe I should get involved with my creation today."

Do you believe the God of the universe knows you personally and has a plan for your life? He does! He has a plan. He knows that plan and we are the pieces that he works with. We at Hope Outreach and the Family Resource Center believe that God has a purpose for this ministry. What an adventure we have as God's children to be a part of his work. Our lives are not accidents. Two years ago we began a wonderful program called Earn While You Learn. It is a program for first time moms and dads, designed to foster responsibility and give parents the ability to provide for the material needs of their child through learning. Since we began, there have been 181 people enroll in the program with 61 babies born. We average 65-70 people in the program at any given time and average 35-40 volunteer mentors.

Just as we felt like we had wrapped our arms around this ministry and were relaxing a bit, God decided to stir things up again. We found out we were not going to be able to stay in our present location and that God, working through Paula, was going to find us our own special place to continue the work he had begun.

At the moment we are slightly overwhelmed but are excited that we will have a building designed to fit the needs and purposes of our ministry. Our new home will be 815 W. Broadway. We will be there by June 1st.

Are we sad? No! We are looking forward with anticipation to the future. CLOSED DOORS - OPENED DOORS, God has special plans for both. Great plans to prosper us and to give those who enter our doors hope and plans for a future. May we in our everyday lives have the faith to trust in the Designer God to work all things for the good of those who are called according to his purpose. We're looking forward to seeing how God is going to make all the pieces fit.

I became director of Earn While You Learn just as we moved into our present location on West Cherokee. Although I missed all the remodel work I still had plenty to do. The West Cherokee building felt right, and it has been a joy to be here for the past year and a half. So when I learned we had to move, I felt somewhat like someone leaving their first home. A little sad, a little apprehensive.

But when Paula took us through the building at 815 W. Broadway, even as an empty shell, I was relieved from my first impression. It felt right. And now that we are half-way into the project (probably completed by the time you read this) I am really excited.

With 70 girls enrolled in classes and only 3 mentoring rooms, we were maxed out at our old location. Now we will have six mentoring rooms and custom made areas for each aspect of our program. We will be able to help people in such a better way. And we will be able to accommodate the 20 girls that are on the waiting list.

We only need one HUGE thing -- more mentors! We need people that are willing to spend 1 hour a week helping a first time mom (and some dads) gain confidence and assurance in the pregnancy and parenting process.

Please come see our new place. Let us show you not only the value of our classes, but also the ease with which they can be presented. We would love to show you around and have you join our great team.

My heart is thankful for the way God has cared for us during this time, and thankful to all the wonderful people that help us minister to these new moms and dads.



"Choices Matter"

As the summer season is upon us, perhaps we can take a moment to evaluate the health of our decision making processes and skills. Our actions must back up our words, and our beliefs must be lived out in our lives. Life is full of choices; each day, we must decide what to do, where to go, who to see, what to say...and so on. Essentially, we choose how we are going to live. Sometimes the choices are simple. Other times, they are difficult, and we can alter our lives in a negative or difficult way, depending upon what we choose.

How can one best live realizing that each choice we make, large or small, in some way builds our life and plots our course? First, we must learn to weigh our options. Even if the choice at hand seems insignificant, we can consider how it might affect us. For example, if we were faced with the decision to eat French Fries or carrot sticks, we might consider it to be unimportant. However, should we choose the fries over the carrots day in and day out, our doctor might relay the health consequences of such a decision. It could lead to making other unhealthy eating decisions, which could lead to unhealthy eating patterns, which could lead to weight gain, increased risk of heart disease, and so on. In the end, that seemingly small, insignificant decision can change one's future! Each decision we make deserves due consideration.

Secondly, we must hold fast to our convictions and beliefs. We must cultivate values and morals in our own lives in order to have the strength to do the right thing. Many times, adults fail to make the very same "good decisions" we expect young people to make. When we pay attention to our values and morals, we are more likely to make a healthy choice. Likewise, if we want to instill these values and morals to younger generations, we must stand up for what we say we believe and do what we say we should do.

When speaking to young people about decision making skills, they often do not

understand how the choices they make today can change their lives tomorrow. Sometimes it seems easier to live in the moment rather than think of the future and consider how each moment builds upon another moment, soon shaping our lives. This happens whether we make good decisions or not. Teenagers are quite capable of looking at the future and weighing each decision based upon the consequences, be the outcome positive or negative. Adults can help young people do this. As adults, we need to set the example of good decision making and character-building. The world can change one positive influence at a time! We can make each decision count for moving forward in our own lives and contributing to the furtherance of God's Kingdom.

One last thought upon which we can reflect as we live each day trying to move forward: "Labor to keep alive in your breast that little spark of celestial fire called conscience" #110, George Washington's Rules of Civility.

have the means to help them right now." We need to start now to be ready when cold weather comes back. And despite how hot it may be today when you are reading this, as Oklahoman's we know cold weather is coming back.

And we thought we knew **where** and **how much**. We leased -- with the option to buy - a building at 815 W. Broadway. We tore down some walls, got an architect to put together a proposal for services, put out the word in our newsletter and began gathering some resources. We hoped to start simple, spending the minimum to get things going.

We learned not much in life is simple, or inexpensive. But we were prepared to persevere, hang in there, keep going.

This is when the adjustment had to take place. Right in the smack-middle of all that we ran into some unbelievable difficulty with our landlord for the Family Resource Center on West Cherokee. The difficulty is so

running since last newsletter except now I'm not sure where I'm going. So I prayed.

"Dear Father...you know I've always been impatient and I dislike waiting. I have this incredible energy that I want to release and no place to put it. I know that your plan will always be bigger and better than mine. I'm asking for a sign Lord in the direction you want me to go. I have people coming into Hope Outreach that need help. Just today a young mother with a three year old will be homeless starting tomorrow (April 29). We have men, women, children, drug addicts, alcoholics, the abused, the mentally ill and those that just want to give up, coming to us for help. Lord, you know what I ask before I ask it and you know what I need before I need it. Thank you Lord! Thank you for loving me! Thank you for hearing me and giving me what I ask. I praise you Lord! In Jesus name, Amen."

That was on Good Friday and on Easter Monday I got my sign. I was with Paula Nightengale and we were looking at possible buildings for our future R.O.O.F. As we were walking around the backside of one of the buildings I looked down, saw a penny

and picked it up. There was nothing special about it, same color, same size and same value as any other penny. That's when I saw those words, "In God We Trust". Here was my sign.

Years earlier, I had received an e-mail from my oldest brother Michael about a financially successful business man who picked up a penny. This business man stated, "When I see a coin, I pray, I stop to see if my trust IS in God at that moment. I pick the coin up as a response to God; that I do trust in Him. For a short time, at least, I cherish it as if it were gold. I think it is God's way of starting a conversation with me."

The following Sunday I shared this e-mail with my Sunday school class. I didn't have enough pennies to pass around so I gave quarters instead, along with the email. After a good laugh we all got the message. The One who loves us more than we could possibly imagine is the One we are to trust, with everything.

God knew years ago that I would need that memory and that moment one day. He tells us in, Proverbs 3:5-6, "Trust in the Lord

with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight."

Unusual Object Lesson

Take a deep breath in and exhale because summer is here! Summer has always been a time of relaxation and fun. As a child I would run around without a care in the world riding bikes, swimming, skating and chasing butterflies. Just look at the beautiful world around you. Who knew that we had so much?

A few weeks ago, I was working in my yard and I saw something that looked quite unusual beneath my sycamore tree. I bent down to get a closer look at the pink almost transparent blob on the ground. Lying there on its back lay a tiny little bird barely hatched from its egg. Its eyes were still closed, its feathers had not formed and it was smaller than the palm of my hand. I assumed it had died from the fall, but as I looked more closely; its tiny little chest pumped up and down very fast savoring every little breath it could take.

Up in the tree, the nest full of its brothers and sisters chirped loudly, probably afraid they would be blown out of the tree next

with the gusty Oklahoma wind. The mother also stood in the nest twittering about protecting the babies she still had left. As we all know, when a little bird falls out of its nest, the mother does nothing to save her baby.

I grabbed a Kleenex to pick it up, and as it sensed I was there, its neck lifted up its head and its beak opened up a little bit, but the little bird just couldn't fathom a sound. My heart went out to this bird, but I knew there was nothing I could do for it. Its mother had deserted it and unable to move or help itself, this bird had no hope of being saved.

So, what does this bird story have to do with Community Care? Recently, I have been seeing more and more people, much like this fallen bird come into Hope Outreach, particularly the homeless. After talking to over 20 homeless people including 2 families and 3 single mother households in one month, I began to see a theme. All of these people had no one to turn to and were in search for some hope.

Just like the bird that fell out of the tree, these people had fallen, sometimes because of their own choices, but they did not have a mother or a friend to pick them up and put them back in the nest.

Normally in Community Care, not as many homeless people come in, but since the word has been out about the R.O.O.F., our day refuge for the homeless, every week I see several. Many times I talk to people about the homeless, and they find it hard to believe that they are here. I have lived in Enid my whole life and I never knew it either. But they do exist in our quaint little town, and they do need a place to turn to that offers them hope.

God can use people just like you or me to be the light of hope that can send someone in the right direction rather than leaving them helpless on the ground. We can't cure all needs of those who are abandoned and hurt, but we can give them hope in something greater. Ephesians 4:14-15 says, "Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind.... Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will in all things grow up into him who is the Head, that is, Christ."

So at the R.O.O.F., we hope to build up the helpless and the fallen that have been blown out of the nest and allow God to build them a home that stands firm on the rock, who is Christ Jesus.
